ost people involved in aviation can tell you about that special airplane or flight that truly is unforgettable. I'd like to share one with all of you. January is a bittersweet month for me to share this.

The story is about a Piper Tri-Pacer, N3925P, that my brother Mike owned when I was young. January is the month we lost him



to cancer, some years ago. My sister Barb was also with us for this flight, and unfortunately she has also recently passed away due to complications from Parkinson's disease. The memories are mixed.

Mike was my oldest brother, and to say I looked up to him would be an understatement. He was a pilot when I was a boy wanting to be a pilot, and he owned an airplane when I was a boy dreaming of owning an airplane. You get the picture. (Though as I often say in the hopes of being accurate, I now know that it is the airplane, or *airplanes*, that own me, not the other way round)

While I cannot be sure, I am fairly certain the flight was also in January, as I know we cleaned snow off the wings before departing Morey's Field (C29) in Middleton, WI. The destination? The EAA Museum, then located in Hales Corners, WI. Since Hales Corners closed around August 1977, this had to be earlier than that.

According to EAA, "While our annual fly-in & convention moved to Oshkosh in 1970, our headquarters remained in Hales Corners, WI, until the opening of the EAA Aviation Center, including what was then known as the EAA Air Adventure Museum, in 1983." My guess is this was January of 1977.

N3925P was not exactly a showplane. She was old and tired, she lived outdoors at a tie-down, and she had a musty smell. But my

My first flight into the EAA Convention (fondly referred to as "Oshkosh" and now named AirVenture) was in the back of that airplane later that same year.

The sounds and smells of flights in 25 Papa are etched in my mind, though the years have mixed them all up. The sight of my brother reaching over his head to adjust the trim was enough to have me mimic the behavior in the back seat of my mother's car every time we drove. His Ray Ban sunglasses and the smile on his face every time we flew are unforgettable. The sound of the engine, the wind on the fabric, my brother talking to me...

Years later, Mike owned a Luscombe, and that *was definitely* a showplane!

I cannot tell you much about the flight to Hales Corners, other than it was cold in the back of the Tri-Pacer. If I recall correctly, the runway was grass and I remember we parked across the street from the museum. (I confess to having cheated and looking this up to be sure - see <u>this website</u> for some history about the airport)

I can, however, tell you a lot about that museum visit! As a young boy who was enthralled with all things aviation, the museum was a magical place. At the time, the museum was a bit less "perfect" than what we see in Oshkosh. The buildings were full of aircraft and artifacts, but it was the person that I met there that I remember most.

In the coming weeks, Rick will be installing the wings and finishing off the numerous odds and ends that go along with a build of this nature as it nears first flight. Rick jokes (I hope it's a joke) that the toughest part of build is whatever he is doing next!!

He'll be looking for hangar help when he is ready to attach the wings. Rich Tichy, our chapter technical advisor and an RV-6 builder, says you should have 4 people to attach the wings.

RV14A by Dave Gustafson

Dave project is a little over 6 years and going. The RV-14 was moved into the hangar a little over a year ago. Progress has been slow and steady. The fuselage is on the gear and the engine and prop have been installed. Dave has been working with his two sons and coming along nicely. Current activity is centered around the numerous connections associated with the engine and installation and fitting up of the engine cowling.



Coming down the line will be the instrument panel. The wings are ready for installation but will wait until the interior of the plane is essentially compete before putting them on.

Dave has made several upgrades to the Vans kit including the brakes, brake lines, and pitot static system. Dave has learned, as most kit builders have, every time you deviate from the plans, almost always for an upgrade, you add cost, complexity and perhaps more than a little bit of frustration.

Dave is a bit reluctant to put a target date for first flight—probably a good idea.

Dean's RV14 is sitting side by side with Dave's. Almost looks like a factory production line! Dean moved into the hangar about a year ago. Since his retirement Dean has been able to devote more time to the project and so progress is a bit faster, at least so far, than many others.

The clock time so far is about 3 ¹/₂ years. Currently Dean is working on several areas including, the wings (quick build wings to start with), instrument panel, tail feathers, and canopy. He is hoping to have the plane on the gear some time in February. Once the plane is on the gear then it is time to install the engine which has been sitting in a box in the hangar.



Dean characterizes the build as about 90% of the time its great fun and enjoyment, 10% of the time its frustration at a very high level.

A big surprise for Dean has been the cost of the many tools it takes to build the kit. Dean used to think he had a reasonably will stocked tool chest. Not even close when it comes building an all metal airplane! As with the other builders on RV row Dean is getting great help and advice (most of it good!) from other builders and EAA members.

Dean is very optimistically thinking he will be "in the sky by 4th of July. Could be if he can spend the time necessary! Still a lot to do before first flight.
